



Our Year 7 students are embarking on a historical inquiry based around Roman times.


Students can access the library website with a dedicated page to help students choose sources to use in their assignment.

Our English Head of Department weighs in with her latest reading ...




Despite my preference for either Regency romance novels (statistically, romance is the most popular and most profitable novel genre, generating around \$1.44 billion every year) or novels which include paranormal characters (think Cassandra Clare's *The Mortal Instruments* series, or Alison Goodman's *Lady Helen* series), I have recently enjoyed reading *The Boy in The Striped Pyjamas* and the sequel, *All the Broken Places*.

John Boyne has taken the tragedy of the Holocaust and written stories about two German characters – the boy is Bruno and his sister is Gretel -whose experience of World War II is very different.

Despite the emotional challenge of Bruno's story and the very effective, yet childish aesthetic, I enjoyed *All*

the Broken Places more. Like all great and memorable characters, Gretel is obviously flawed – she is a delightful combination of human characteristics: selfish, brave and uncompromising. She is both likeable and disappointing, making her, I believe, a very realistic heroine.

I enjoyed both novels and admire Boyne's ability to tell totally different stories about the same family. I recommend you read these novels.

Year 7 Science - Separating Mixtures


For the past several weeks the Year 7 Science students have been learning about how to separate various materials which have been mixed together.

This is an important concept because most naturally occurring substances are not chemically pure, and require separation in order for us to be able to use them; consider purifying drinking water, or extracting minerals from ores.

The Year 7s have been drawing on knowledge gained from earlier in the term, when they learned about the physical and chemical properties of different materials. By exploiting differences in physical properties in different materials, students have applied processes like magnetic separation, filtration and evaporation to separate materials.

In addition to learning these separation techniques themselves, students have been reflecting on how effectively they have applied them, in order to ensure precision and reliability. This evaluation process is important to the development of all skills, and is applicable to all areas of life and learning, not just Year 7 Science labs.

So the next time you get accidentally pour salt into your pepper grinder, and you need to get it all back out again, you'll know who in the house call upon.

















Year 9 - Body Coordination and Diseases

The "rubber hand illusion" is a fascinating demonstration of how our brain integrates sensory information to construct a sense of body ownership. In this experiment, participants see a fake rubber arm being stroked simultaneously with their real hidden arm, which is also being stroked. This sensory congruence creates a conflict in the brain's representation of the body, leading the brain to incorporate the fake arm into the body schema. The illusion works because the brain's pathways for touch and proprioception—sensing the position and movement of our limbs—become confused. The primary somatosensory cortex, which processes tactile information, and the parietal cortex, involved in spatial awareness and body representation, both play key roles. When these areas receive conflicting signals from the real and fake arms, the brain recalibrates its body map, leading to the false but convincing sensation that the fake arm is part of one's own body. This experiment highlights the brain's remarkable ability to adapt and integrate sensory information to maintain a coherent sense of self.



Minds in Motion

Throughout Semester 1 in the Clontarf space, we tried a new initiative called "Minds in Motion". This initiative has been focused on the Year 7 Clontarf boys around their English and Math assessments in Term 1 and Term 2. In the build up to their English and Math assessments throughout both terms, the boys stayed behind after school for 3 weeks in a row during Term 1- and 4 weeks during Term 2 to do extra revision and work on their drafts/final assessment pieces. What was great is that the English and Math HODS were on board and were able to support our initiative by getting teachers from their faculties to offer their valuable time to come help our young men with their revision and assessment. The buy in from our Year 7 cohort has been very positive with 15 – 20 Year 7 boys staying back at any one time for these sessions. Over the 7 sessions we have completed in semester 1, we are averaging 17 boys per session, which is outstanding to see these young men being so committed to investing in their education

The aim in creating "Minds in Motion" as a Clontarf activity for our new Year 7 students this year is to align what we are doing in our space with HSHS and Queensland Education Departments vision of working towards students achieving C's or better and B's or better. If we can help ever so slightly in this space, school becomes a much more enjoyable place when you are having success within the classroom.

We have continued to run our "Minds in Motion" sessions in Term 3 with our first session in Week 8 focused around Math, in the build up to the Year 7 assessments during Week 9 and 10 of Term 3. We had 16 boys stay behind for our first session of Term 3 which was great. Week 9 will see two Minds in Motion sessions, one focused on English on Monday, where boys will finish their drafts or continue to type up their final assessments on the computer and the second on Wednesday where boys will get one last top up of any Math work and skills needed before their up and coming tests.


Here is a little break down of how the afternoon looks when we run a "Minds in Motion" session:

- 3.00pm: Boys make their way to the Clontarf room for light afternoon tea
- 3.20pm: Head upstairs to a E-Block classroom with Clontarf staff and teachers who have volunteered their time.
- 4.05pm/4.10pm: 45 50 minutes minds in motion session finishes.
- 4.10pm: American Hotdogs together in the Clontarf room, plus some pool and table tennis
- 4.30pm onwards: Clontarf staff to drop student's home.

Clontarf staff are very thankful to all the English and Math staff who have volunteered their time to stay behind and help out with these sessions. The boys who have turned up each week have really enjoyed the more relaxed approach to doing their school work in an environment where the support is more intensified with teachers being able to work with very small group numbers to pump out and achieve a lot of work being completed.

- 8. Mock interviews (throughout their journey)
- 9. Graduation Employment Plans (GEP)

As well as having an employment blitz week this week, we were fortunate enough to have a work site visit at Kearneys Spring Kmart. Kearneys Spring Kmart are in the process of wanting to hire staff for the upcoming Christmas period which provided a group of our work ready students a great opportunity to head to Kmart after school to meet one of the store managers and be a part of a work site visit. They represented themselves, the school and the Foundation extremely well as they got to see the ins and outs of all the different opportunities that Kmart have to offer.
